Penn Quarter Museums are the Hit of the Season!

DC's Spy, Crime & Punishment, and Wax Museums Experience High Holiday Attendance

Washington, DC – 12 January 2009– DC's Penn Quarter Museums are the hit of the holiday season! Madame Tussauds Wax Museum saw an attendance increase of 5.43% between the Christmas and New Year holidays in 2008 and at The National Museum of Crime & Punishment attendance tripled the previous three week's attendance. The International Spy Museum sold more admission tickets that same week than in any prior year, including the opening year in 2002!

At The National Museum of Crime & Punishment officials were thrilled with the high end-of-year attendance. "Although we do not have year over year data since we have only been open six months, we were pleasantly surprised to finish the year on such a high note" stated Chief Operating Officer, Janine Vaccarello. "The last week of the year tripled the previous weeks in December."

In just one week, over 17,600 guests purchased admission tickets, packing exhibit halls and surpassing the International Spy Museum's previous 2004 record. Museum officials were extremely pleased to have found that the Museum delivered this incredible achievement in the current downturn economy. Like most museums in the city, the Spy Museum anticipated little, if any, growth from previous years. "I think this speaks volumes about the strength of the International Spy Museum's brand" stated Karen Corbin, the Museum's Chief Operating Officer. "We did see increased visitation from the surrounding counties, which, coupled with continued robust business from the tourism market, created the strong showing. Our 2008 push for

greater brand awareness and recognition in the DC metro area and its surrounding counties is ensuring a meaningful and long life for our ground-breaking cultural institution.”

The Spy Museum continues to be one of the top destinations of visitors to DC, averaging #2 on their list of attractions to see in the nation’s capital. The Museum is also doing increasingly well in the local market, with 38% of guests this holiday season visiting from the District, Maryland and Virginia. Previous years saw local DC metro area visitation closer to 20%.

The popularity of the International Spy Museum’s interactive special experience, Operation Spy, contributed to the increased visitation as well—the exhibition was sold out through much of the week. Operation Spy allows guests to take on the role of a spy on an international mission to save the world from nuclear destruction.

As a result of the unprecedented popularity of the award winning Operation Spy, the Museum is creating a new offering, Spy at Night, which launches 9 January 2009. Spy at Night will offer exclusive evening access to Operation Spy, programmed to include a variety of specially tailored spy skill challenges, including secret message deciphering contests and spy trivia competitions. Spies at Night will also be able to enjoy cool cocktails and a mouth watering bar menu from Zola’s award winning kitchen in the newly transformed Spy Cafe. Operation Spy

A new and groundbreaking immersive adventure that takes the interactive concept to a higher level, Operation Spy provides guests with the chance to adopt the role of an intelligence officer in the field. In an action-packed hour, participants engage in an international mission to locate a missing nuclear device before it falls into the wrong hands. This intense experience combines live-action, video characters, themed environments, special effects, and hands-on activities. Participants take part in an intrigue-filled adventure based on actual cases drawn from intelligence files. Challenged to “feel, think, and act” like real intelligence officers, they uncover layers of deception to reveal a world of double agents and corrupt officials. Featuring the largest permanent collection of international spy-related artifacts on public display, the International Spy Museum is the only public museum in the United States solely dedicated to espionage and the only one in the world to provide a global perspective on this profession. The Museum is located at 800 F Street, NW in Washington, DC's historic Penn Quarter, within 4 blocks of the National Mall and within one block of the Gallery Place/Chinatown Metrorail station serviced by the red, yellow and green lines.
